

# Searching JSTOR for Literary Criticism

Select JSTOR from the library's list of databases. JSTOR is a multi-disciplinary, archival database that includes back issues of more than 1,000 academic journals. It now offers current content for approximately 150 journals, as well, but for most journals the most recent issues for most titles will be 3 to 5 years old. This time lag between publication and availability in JSTOR is known as a "moving wall". JSTOR also contains pamphlets, manuscripts, letters, images and monographs from special collections on Great Britain, Ireland and Africa.

The interface opens with the basic search screen. The advanced search screen offers features similar to those in EbscoHost databases.

In the advanced screen, we can limit the search for our terms to particular fields of the record, and choose to include only results that are available in full-text through JSTOR or also those that are available through other sources. Chambers Library's subscription to JSTOR provides full text access to 275 of the titles in the database in the Arts & Sciences, Ecology and Biology. Citations for articles in other journals will include links for checking the library's access through other sources.

We can also limit to specific types of materials, date ranges, languages, or to particular journals by discipline or by title.

A full-text search for "Young Goodman Brown" as a phrase gives us almost 200 items that we can access in full-text within JSTOR. We can switch to "all content" to see results that are available through other sources, such as Interlibrary loan or the UCO print collection.

Note that for articles not available in full text, a complete citation is provided.

Summary information, including abstracts, when available, bibliographic information, and information on the author, is provided for full-text articles, along with a copy of the article in PDF.

A pop-up window states the copyright restrictions on usage of the materials in the database, which we acknowledge by proceeding to the full text PDF. The material can be printed, saved, or e-mailed for your personal use within an educational setting using the icons within the PDF window.
